I would like to thank with all my heart the many, hard working volunteers who have been helping on this project. It truly takes a village (or 2) to build a house. Women Build Day – a Day of Fun and Accomplishments

At 8 a.m. with blue sky and a cool temperature, 15 women and three men arrived for Habitat's National Women Build Day on April 30. As the day progressed sweatshirts and jackets were replaced by bright red t-shirts as the temperatures climbed. The build took place in West Point on the Chavez house. Sponsored by Habitat for Humanity International and Lowe's, all participants received a t-shirt, water bottle, lip balm, visor and tool apron. Construction site supervisor, Ken Dever, and advisor Bruce Powell discussed the build plan for the day, listed safety issues and got the group started on interior and exterior tasks that included wrapping the house to protect from moisture, nailing the insulation boards to the outside, and putting in vents.

A delicious lunch of salad, two kinds of sandwiches and cookies was provided by The Foxes Inn in Sutter Creek. Owner of the Inn is Monique Graziadei. The 15 women who participated in the build day were: LaVonne Chavez, home owner in waiting, Janelle Anderson, Carol Darrow, Rhonda Hazelwood, Diana Inslee, Janet Thompson and Soroptomist Karen Varni, all of West Point, Donna Vial of Rail Road Flat, Lucy Thein and Adriane Reimer of San Andreas, Beth Paich of Valley Springs, Carin Reimer of Stockton, and Soroptomist Chryl Hillis of Angels Camp. Incoming volunteer coordinator Jayne Henning-Childress of Mokelumne Hill, and outgoing volunteer coordinator Kathy Heffernan of Camp Connell were also in attendance, as was Thomas Chavez, future homeowner of the house, working hard putting in his sweat equity.

Prior to the build day eight women participated in a How-to-Clinic sponsored by Lowe's of Martell on April 23. Not only did the women learn how to use the tools demonstrated by Kathy Cox, they learned about the newest tools available at Lowe's. The following participated in the clinic: LaVonne Chavez, Jayne Childress, Carol Darrow, Rhonda Hazelwood, Kathy Heffernan, Habitat Board member Chris Sellman from Angels Camp, and Janet Thompson and Barbara Vahle of Arnold.

Habitat for Humanity Calaveras is one of 250 affiliates selected to participate in the National Women Build Day. By filling all requirements, the affiliates will receive a \$5,000 gift card to be used at Lowe's, in our case Lowe's of Martell, for building supplies. Truly a worthwhile effort for all involved!

Another Habitat Success Story

Teresa Renfro owns Habitat house #8 that she helped build in Rancho Calaveras. Since she and her daughter Kaitlynn moved into the home in February 2009, Teresa has been looking for a new job more in line with her interest and on-going education.

Recently she succeeded, landing a full-time position with Villa Toscana Wine Cellars near Plymouth as the person in charge of shipping. The plan was for Teresa to move up the ladder earning more money and more responsibility. Now after several months, she not only runs four wine clubs, but also coordinates the buffet, and serves occasionally as a pourer at wine tastings.

Teresa is also going to college via the internet, aiming for a B.A. in Communications with a focus on New Media. She is learning how internet applications such as blogs and social networking can be used successfully in business. She is currently carrying a GPA of 4.0, and hopes to graduate next June.

Asked how Habitat has made a difference in her life, Teresa says "there is no way I could have done my school work" without the stability and convenience that her home ownership can provide. "Kaitlynn has made many good friends in the neighborhood" says Teresa, and loves having a room of her own.

Teresa feels "being a part of the community" and has made solid connections with her neighbors. One neighbor helped her get the job at Toscana, while another occasionally provides child care for Kaitlynn when her regular child care is not available.

There is no doubt in Teresa's mind that Habitat has been big factor in improving her life. Her experience typifies what many studies have shown: compared to rental, the stability of home ownership provides families with an improved potential for personal and social growth. It certainly provides us Habitatters with a sense of gratitude for the opportunity to help deserving local families.

Habitat Calaveras Attends Conference in Atlanta, GA

Board members Chris Sellman, Alice Williams, Myron Kelso, and Administrative Manager Frank Meyer took time from their personal lives to attend the Habitat for Humanity Annual Conference in Atlanta, Georgia. The conference was held March 22-25 at the beautiful Hyatt Hotel complex in the heart of downtown. Over 1200 Habitat attendees filled the hotel rooms and conference to overflow capacity. On a more modest budget, Calaveras attendees stayed a few blocks away in a more 'modest' hotel most noted for its down-home talking sponsor, Tom Bodett (Enough said).

With over 200 different workshops over a period of three days, the crew was kept busy going from seminar to seminar taking notes on subjects ranging from A Brush With Kindness, fundraising, financial sustainability, ReStore operations, and even classes on social networking! All attendees gathered at three plenary sessions, where inspirational speeches fired us all up.

There were vendors and exhibitors in a large hall, representing small business partners and large corporations. Of particular note was a wonderful booth with Habitat Partners from all over the world. They presented their projects to help deserving families find affordable housing. It was amazing to see and hear the wonderful work that tithes from Calaveras and other affiliates accomplishes around the world. From memorable conference subjects, to new friends made, to very interesting hotel accommodations, the trip was an experience of a lifetime. Attendees returned with new found enthusiasm and helped establish new goals with the information they brought back from the conference.



Retreat Generates New Goals

Habitat board members met recently with staff for a day long retreat to review Habitat Conference programs, assess the previous year accomplishments, and set goals for the next fiscal year. First task of the day was an overview of the annual Habitat Conference in Atlanta, attended by several Habitat members (see related story). Completing that, a lively discussion ensued on Habitat's current goals (housing for at least 1 new Habitat family a year, enhance revenue streams, increase exposure to community) and whether changes were in order.

The group divided into discussion groups and upon returning gave reports on their results and recommendations. Those recommendations were tabulated and from that, three goals for the new fiscal year were formulated. After subsequent discussion the Board adopted three goals for the 2011-12 Fiscal Year: Ensure Sustainability, Upgrade ReStore, and Develop Alternative Services to Families.

Ensure Sustainability will include; exploring feasibility of the federally funded USDA Direct Loan Program, shifting focus to projects with lower per unit cost of service (A Brush With Kindness, critical home repairs, finding business sponsors for same), monetizing assets and cultivating major sponsors. Upgrade ReStore: includes improving efficiency/effectiveness of current facility, rehabbing the existing ReStore, and exploring future expansion. Develop Alternative Services to Families: refers to the details of implementing a Critical Home Repairs component in addition to ABWK, including appropriation of the necessary funding .

Habitat Calaveras sees a lot of potential in the goals established for 2011-12. If you want to volunteer to help, call Jayne Henning Childress at 754-1149. Help is needed from contractors, business sponsors, material sponsors, financial experts, realtors, or anyone with knowledge or a skill they feel will assist Habitat Calaveras build and/or rehab decent homes for deserving families.
